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Miss Jyoti Shah, Consultant Surgeon

Our very own consultant surgeon from Queen's Hospital has won the top award of the night at the prestigious Asian Women of Achievement Awards hosted in London, in front of an audience including HRH the Duchess of Gloucester and Home Secretary Theresa May.

In iss Jyoti Shah, who specialises in urology, was the unanimous choice of the judging panel to be honoured with the RBS AWA Chairman's Award last month. They described her mix of clinical and academic work as world-class.

Chair of the judges Sir Nicholas Young, former CEO of the British Red Cross, said the judges were stunned by her commitment to the NHS and public good. He described her as passionate about improving the quality in her profession and giving the very best in patient care. He said: "The judges have no doubt she will never stop striving to be a force for good in the world."

Fifty accomplished women, including a stand-up comedian, TV reporters, actresses, senior executives and successful entrepreneurs were shortlisted from about 150 nominations for the awards, now in their 16th year.

Jyoti said: "I've never won an award in my life. It was a complete shock," she said. "I feel so honoured when you look at the amazing women that were there on the night. I have one rule – to treat each patient as if they were one of my own family members, for whom I would do anything to help".
